Last month, I asked for members to contribute a little something to our Newsletter and here is something from Sylvia Wain:

I have some news for MU in November. I would like to tell you about the foxes I have fed for many years. It is now more important than ever to protect our wildlife with this pandemic. I put out dog food each night for these urban foxes and have done so for many years. It is a real struggle for them to feed themselves, and when they do, it is not enough to sustain them, especially with the colder weather in Winter. I have experienced the joy of playful cubs each year, and when they are weaned off the vixens milk, I make sure that they each have plenty to eat. Occasionally I give them an uncooked egg in the shell. Watching them skilfully remove the shell with their mouths without cracking the egg is a real joy, and a mystery too, as these little ones do not lose the egg to the ground. Quite often the foxes bury their food for when it is scarce, for example when snow lies on the ground. I feed them at around 5 p.m. each evening. When I rattle the tin and call them and call them for supper. If it is particularly cold, I ensure they have enough to last them.



This year, the vixen did not appear for a while, and now I assume that she has died due to old age. She used to come to our patio door and make a knocking nise with her paws to let me know she was there and wanted feeding: I always obliged. But the cubs father looked after the them and I saw them grow to adults. I get the feeling that the cubs sometimes visit me because the dish has been taken away in the night and I find no trace of it! I must also add that there is a bit of our garden kept wild to shelter them from any disturbance. Our cat died earlier this year, so when it is raining I feed them outside our shed which is sheltered. In fact, one lot of cubs were born in this shed, they squeak like puppies and are so dependent on their mothers whilst their father hunts for food. Often there are two to four cubs, but this year there were only twins. I see them having a nap in the Summer in the garden and I am hanging out the washing. They are so trusting of me, and this is such a delight.

We hope to hold a quiz afternoon in January. We will be using Zoom for this and if anyone is interested please contact either Pam or Jenny. The finer details have not yet been worked out yet, but, we will let you know in our December newsletter.
